- **Kirkwood Global Exchange Network:** The activities conducted in July were very successful. Thank you to Bob Sanders, Director of University Outreach, for identifying this opportunity and coordinating the events with Kirkwood. Thanks also to everyone on the Leadership Team who supported the program. You can read more about this effort later in this newsletter.
- Professional Development Day (PDD): Planning for our fifth annual PDD is going smoothly. Register
  early to take advantage of the early bird rates and to reserve your seat. Details on the PDD are included
  later in this newsletter. We are following a similar format to last year's PDD, with a morning and an
  afternoon session.
- **2012 Goals:** In January, I described three primary goals for the chapter.
  - o **Fill all open leadership positions:** This was our number one priority for 2012. We finally met this goal in early June, and we are now full-strength on our Leadership Team. Woot!
  - Identify a long-term strategy for the chapter website: A committee was formed earlier in the
    year to review potential options. A comprehensive set of requirements has been documented,
    and a couple of potential solutions have been identified. This work was temporarily put on hold
    until after our PDD. The board opted to pend any further action until the chapter's slower
    months of November through January.
  - Occument, review, and publish chapter bylaws, policies & procedures, and other governance documents: Progress on this goal has been a little slower than planned; however, we have completed a gap analysis of policies and procedures that we are missing. In addition, we have templates or documents from PMI or other chapters that we can leverage to complete this work. We are still on target to have some steady progress on this before the end of the year.

Like any good farmer, I am perusing the seed catalogs to see what will be planted next year to continue the bounty of our chapter in 2013.

• **Nominations:** It is hard to believe that it is already time to be thinking about electing our 2013 Board of Directors. As stated in our chapter bylaws, a Nominating Committee is appointed by the President and is comprised of the most recent past president and two members of the chapter in good standing. The

Nominating Committee prepares a slate of candidates for each board position (President and Vice Presidents of Communication, Education, Finance, Operations, and Outreach). New board members will take office on January 1, 2013. Information about the slate of candidates should be released before the September chapter meeting.

• Leadership Institute Meeting (LIM): The North America LIM will be held in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada October 18-20, 2012. The LIM provides PMI leaders with face-to-face opportunities to connect with and learn from fellow volunteer leaders. At the meetings, PMI leaders collaborate in productive, curriculum-driven educational sessions.

I have the lyrics to the Circle of Life from the Lion King rolling around in my head, "There's more to see than can ever be seen, More to do than can ever be done." That's kind of how I feel right now – there is more that I'd like to do as president but feel like the clock is ticking and before I know it will be time to turn things over to the new president.

#### **News and Views**

#### Kirkwood Global Education Network (GEN) Partnership

Kirkwood College is one of four members of the Global Education Network, a unique international consortium of technical colleges in Singapore, Australia, Canada and the United States. Member institutions include: Box Hill Institute (BHI) in Melbourne, Australia, Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (SAIT) in Calgary, Canada, and Institute of Technical Education (ITE) in Singapore.

Our chapter had a unique opportunity to help coordinate two company events, a chapter breakfast, and a PMI panel discussion in their classroom while the students were in Cedar Rapids for three weeks.

On Tuesday, July 10th, Pearson hosted the students in Iowa City. The session was kicked off with an executive leader welcoming the students to Pearson. Pearson then provided an overview of how project managers go about planning and managing through difficult project situations. Real life examples seemed to pique the most interest of the students and led to several follow-up questions. The students were provided brief demonstrations

of the tools used to manage schedules, requirements, risks, and budgets. Since the event, students and faculty members have followed up with Pearson personnel with requests for project templates and best practice process ideas.

Our journey with the students continued on Thursday, July 12th, where we invited all the students to attend our monthly chapter meeting over breakfast. The students took away some additional insight on how different generations go about their work day. As most of the students are just beginning their careers, we hope they can use some of the information gained to build relationships with co-workers and do what they can to get things done through others. In the afternoon, our Chapter President



and other board members met the students in their classroom to discuss the benefits of the Project Management Institute and key information about their local PMI chapters in their home countries and their offerings for additional professional development.

We finished our journey with the students on Friday, July 13th. Siemens Technology and Linn County hosted our final company event. They met the students at The Jean Oxley Linn County Public Service Center in Cedar Rapids. Siemens discussed their relationship with Linn County and how they are partnering together on projects to help recover from the 2008 flood. The students were given a tour of the recently opened center to show the renovation and expansion project that has improved the layout to better serve the public, protect against future flood threats, and reduces the lifetime operational cost of the building by using energy efficient and sustainable building practices.

Many thanks to Pearson, Siemens Technology, and Linn County for hosting the students in their facilities and sharing their experiences. Thanks to all the PMI board members and volunteers for the support provided to this initiative. We will have another opportunity to do this again in 4 years when another group of students come through Cedar Rapids.

According to Jim Off, Kirkwood Professor and Faculty Member, "This program offers students the opportunity to earn a certificate of completion in Project Management from Kirkwood by learning specific practical applications, and spending nearly three full days implementing their new skills building a house for local needy families through the Cedar Valley Habitat for Humanity chapter in Iowa."

## Journey of a thousand delays!

It had started off as a routine layover at O'Hare. I was travelling to the PMI Seminars World in Florida. We were just about to board our flight from Chicago to Orlando. As they called out the various groups to board the flight, people strolled up to the gate, showed their boarding passes, and then proceeded to queue up on the jet way waiting for someone from the previous group to take their seat(s). Have you noticed that no matter how much scientific analysis and study is undertaken on how to efficiently load a jet liner,

it always seems to be a painful experience?

Suddenly, the gate attendant (let's call him John) came over the PA system and advised "Attention passengers travelling on Flight XXX to Orlando please wait in lounge and do not board the plane. There is a problem with the plane and this will require ground technical crew to check it out before the flight can proceed. Please remain in the gate area for further updates." Sighs erupted amongst those left to board, but I imagined louder moans inside the aircraft. 45 minutes later, they declared the jet unfit to fly and proceeded to disembark passengers from the plane. I thought to myself surely this is a daily risk and so the airline must be prepared for it - right? Another 15 minutes later, in a cheerful voice, John advised that the airline had been able to replace the faulty jet with another one. Risk management is alive and kicking, I thought to myself.

A gate change ensued and people sat patiently waiting for more information which John kept passing us as soon as he knew about it. An hour later he advised that the replacement aircraft was on its way from the hangar and that boarding would begin as soon as the plane was prepped with the beverage carts as well as other ancillary items required for flight. The crew boarded the plane and went about their duties. They started boarding the flight and had groups 1, 2, 3 and 4 on board in record time. Things were looking up and I was just about to hand over my Group 5 boarding ticket to the attendant when I heard John's voice again. "Hold it there. You are not going anywhere." Now what? Was it me that his comment was directed to or someone else behind me? The next few seconds made it all clear as John informed us that they had found a problem with the replacement jet – a more serious one – (presumably why it was in the hangar to begin with) and that it would not be flying anywhere. He had nothing further to add until he was given more information. However, he could say with certainty that there would be another gate change. Louder moans went up in the gate area. I started thinking, come on Mr. Airline, where is your contingency? What were the odds of that happening? Well it didn't really matter what they were because it had occurred. Probability = 1.

An hour and fifteen minutes later John advised that this time they had a working jet available, at a different gate, and passengers should proceed to that gate as quickly as possible. Another 45 minutes later I was – finally - in my seat and soon after that we were taxying out to runway 22L for takeoff. As we hurtled down the runaway to a small round of applause, I pondered what had just occurred over the last few hours and whether the PM-isms of Risk and Time management, that we so passionately embrace and practice, had been applied or abused?

All things considered I believed that they had been applied even if my fellow passengers felt differently. If there was something wrong with my plane, I'd sooner find out before I take off and not after. I may have been over 6 hours late getting where I needed to but I was getting there — alive!



As I glanced out of the aircraft window at the far horizon and was marveling at the orange hue that follows the sunset, I began to ponder seriously about the airport shuttle to my hotel – would it still be there at this hour? Suddenly the tables were turned on me, did I have a contingency?
